#### MICHAEL ROSE KNOPF, SENIOR RABBI

A few weeks ago, our weekly Torah portion focused on the story of the ancient twin cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. In my sermon that Shabbat, which several folks encouraged me to share here (It's too long for this column but can be read in full online: https://



www.rabbiknopf.com/post/keep-your-humanity-face-the-horror-parashat-vayera-5785.), I shared how this story is a cautionary tale about a society so morally bankrupt that it sealed its own destruction. The people of Sodom, according to tradition, had built a culture of cruelty, turning selfishness into law, and even punishing acts of kindness.

Against this backdrop, the family of Abraham's nephew, Lot, offers us glimpses of courage and humanity. In a society that criminalized compassion, Plotit, who according to rabbinic tradition was one of Lot's daughters, risked everything to feed a starving stranger. Tragically, her morally courageous actions led to her public execution — but it was her cry that reached heaven and compelled God to intervene.

Lot's wife, Idit, is also a profile in courage. Contrary to the common assumption that Idit was punished for looking back at her burning city by being turned into a pillar of salt, closer analysis reveals that her gaze wasn't a sin but rather an act of defiance. She turned back, not out of longing for the past, but because she couldn't ignore the cries of her neighbors, her friends, her community. In a world of overwhelming horror, she refused to look away. She could not simply move on without bearing witness, even at great personal cost. Her courage reminds us that confronting injustice often requires witnessing and acknowledging suffering, even when it's difficult or costly.


The examples of Plotit and Idit remind us that justice begins with refusing to avert our eyes and committing to becoming involved. It requires facing the world's brokenness and taking action without losing our values or compassion. The bravery exemplified by these two extraordinary biblical women invites us to ask: How will we respond to injustice in our time? Will we ignore it, turn away, or choose the harder path of seeing and acting?

As we look ahead to the new secular year, we at Temple Beth El are renewing our commitment to confronting injustice in our world and engaging in meaningful action. Guided by the values of our tradition, we are dedicating time and energy to taking our congregation's social justice work further and deeper, strengthening inclusion and mutual support internally, and advancing a more just and compassionate community beyond our walls through direct action and advocacy around systemic issues. To lead this effort, we are re-building our Tzedek Committee as a hub for education, advocacy, and action.

I hope you'll join us in this sacred work. Whether you've been engaged in justice work for years or are just beginning, your voice and heart are needed. Please join us for the Continued on page 4...

of the ways in which we think we are supposed to be good at things, or talented. We often find ourselves admiring the creative lives of people around us, but often fail to realize how much work and effort goes into cultivating the creative arts, whether they be music, art, theater, or poetry. What might appear as someone being, "talented," may very well be true, but as we all know by now, talent can only get someone so far. If you are at a point where you look at the creative pursuits of someone else and think that you'd like to be doing that, if only you had the talent, well then, I'm sharing this for you (And I think that is pretty much all of us.) It takes guts and *chutzpah* to set off and do something that we aspire toward, to start anew with building skills in an area we had previously ignored or abandoned, but it can be some of the most fulfilling practice.

Over the past year, I embraced a beginner's mind with the pursuit of my poetry practice. I was reading the written work of so many friends and colleagues with admiration and, I'll admit, a bit of jealousy that they were able to write so beautifully. Well, you know how the saying goes, "If you want to be a writer, write!" and, "If you want to be a singer, sing! I know this is easier said than done. I had been writing as part of my spiritual practice for a long time but was desirous to study poetry and make deliberate progress toward turning my daily journal writing into poetry. I found a poet I admired, reached out, and asked if she worked 1:1 with emerging poets. To my surprise and bliss, she replied that she did and that she would be happy to begin working with me on ZOOM, from Colorado.

I was terrified and excited. I had never studied poetry before outside of an English class in school and here I was going to work with an award-winning poet who I admire greatly. Despite my fears, I decided to give myself complete permission to be a beginner and I went into these sessions with the desire for playful expression and wanting to, "write into the fullness of my humanity."

I learned so much and took one of my earliest poems through several iterations until I landed with this piece that I'd like to share with you as we enter the secular New Year. In this poem, Ripple, I attempt to touch the cyclical passage of time and the complexity of intergenerational connection.

Ripple by Cantor Katie Kaplan

A rock, tossed long ago into the Sea of Fate sends ripples out through time and space. I bend down at the water's edge

to pick it up.

Here, at the intersection of past and future I meet my loneliness. I've been moving through rituals, striving to make my life add up to something tangible as this rock, a legacy to pass down, a testament to having lived.

I sift through memories seeking the strength and wisdom of my ancestors— the fortitude of my father's father the tenacity of my mother's mother. But it's my own blurred reflection gazing back at me on the surface of the water.

Did they search for me years ago when the routine of living wore them down?
Did they hope I would one day find in their longing, a message of truth tumbled and smoothed by years of heartache and love?

Turning the rock over in my hand, I feel the certainty of our unbroken connection and for a moment, face to face with the eternal, this gift makes perfect sense, resting gently in my palm.

## WE WELCOME YOU TO JOIN US ON SHABBAT MORNINGS

We warmly welcome you to show up for services on Shabbat in whatever way is meaningful to you. A reminder: you don't have to attend services to come for lunch on Shabbat! Services begin at 10 am, and we get to lunch around 12:15 pm. You can also show up for and/or leave services any time:

- From 10 until about 10:30 am, we sing the joyous and soulful melodies of P'sukei D'zimrah, the preliminary service.
- •From about 10:30 to 10:45 am is the morning service, Shaharit (including greatest hits like Shema and the Amidah).
- We take the Torah out at about 10:45 am, and chant from the Torah and Haftarah portions until about 11:30 am.
- The D'var Torah (sermon) takes place around 11:30 am.

Between 11:45 am-12:15 pm, we conclude the service with Musaf, Aleinu, and Adon Olam (we always invite children up to help lead some of these final prayers, and any kid who helps lead gets to pick a prize from the Rabbi's "Tchotchke Chest"!).

And for those who wish to partake, you are welcome to make a "L'chaim!" with us on a beverage of your choosing (whether alcoholic or non-alcoholic) after services. I can personally guarantee good bourbon, an awesome and creative signature cocktail based on the weekly Torah portion, and even better schmoozing!

# In Tribute to Alberto Eyzaguirre and in Remembrance of Ellen Gottfried

When I heard that Alberto Eyzaguirre was leaving TBE after 50 years of dedicated service, and since I



was unable to attend the service where he was honored, I knew that I had to send this note of thanks, not just on my behalf, but on behalf of all the clergy that I partnered with during his time here I know that Rabbi Goldman and Hazzan Rabinowitz in particular would want to chime in, were they able – so I speak for them too.

It took me many years to figure out how to pronounce Alberto's last name. But I finally figured out the key to remembering how to do it. The last syllable of that name is also a Hebrew word, *Ger*. In Hebrew it literally means stranger, but in the Bible, it has a special meaning. A *Ger toshav* was a very special member of the community. He wasn't so much a stranger as a resident stranger. It almost seems a contradiction in terms. But this resident who wasn't quite a member of the tribe, was supposed to be treated with the utmost of respect, and to have most of the privileges of membership, including resting on Shabbat, ample food and clothing, everything.

This highly respected person, this *Ger toshav*, played an important role. As Jewish history evolved, it became clear that non-Jews were often needed to perform tasks that Jews were forbidden to do, like turn on the synagogue lights on Shabbat. And the *Ger toshav* was so highly regarded because here was a person who didn't have to cast his lot among us, but who chose to, in every way. And finally, the *Ger toshav* played a very important role in teaching Jews and their children the merits of hospitality. How could we expect to be a Godlike people if we can't even treat those living amongst us with kindness?

The beloved educator at JTS, Rabbi Joseph Lukinsky z'l, one of the preeminent scholars in the field of Jewish education of the past century, used to teach his classes of rabbinical students that the synagogue had no more significant educator on its staff than the custodian. That was certainly true for Alberto. Alberto was so much more to us than a mere employee. He always went above and beyond the call, and always with a smile. He was the first to welcome guests here, and the first to smile back pleasantly, even on those rare times when congregants might have treated him with somewhat less courtesy than he deserved. He was in many ways the face of TBE. He never complained, even when this rabbi changed his mind five times about a set-up and asked him to do something at the last minute. He taught us about hachnasat orchim, welcoming guests, he taught us about greeting everyone with a smile, he was a mensch in every sense of the term, and our primary role model for menschlichkeit in the building.

And everybody loved him, the kids too. When my

family went to the movies once back when my kids were young, I recall Ethan tugging at me and saying, "There's Alberto," and sure enough there he was, with his family, and my kids ran over to say hello. I ran over too, after first doing a double take, amazed that he wasn't still at TBE setting up for the next day, knowing how incredibly busy that weekend had been for us.

Alberto was always here for us in other ways as well. Not just with his hands, but with his heart. He was always asking about Judaism, and when he wasn't working, he was listening to the service and often could recall my messages years later. And, like the *Ger toshav* of old, he has truly cast his lot with us. Our house was his house, and he cared more for every corner of it more than anyone else. And even when I began to move into my new home here in Madison, Alberto offered to make the 50-mile drive – on his own time – and do a few quick repairs that we needed. I rode with him, and it was one of the best talks we ever had. It was at that time, just days before my own final service, when he mentioned that he was facing the pivotal decision to retire, after so many years of service. He loved his work and this community, but he knew that his time was fast approaching.

One other great talent that he had: Alberto was a genuine dog whisperer, a definite job necessity when so much of his work was at the rabbi's house, and the rabbi had multiple dogs. When they saw Alberto coming, they yelped with anticipation, but also know that they had best not yelp too much. One little gesture from Alberto snapped them right into line.

My deepest thanks to Alberto, and to Patty, who also gave of herself for our community (and babysat for my kids too). We are all so grateful for all that you have done.

And while I'm at it, another note of appreciation, this one sadder. Many of you will recall Ellen Gottfried, who worked in our office for a number of years, often giving special assistance to clergy and the Hebrew School, and working on our weekly announcements. Ellen passed away several weeks ago. Hers was not an easy life, and she found great fulfillment and purpose in her work at TBE. We also were a valued support system for her as she confronted life's challenges. I know that many of you were personally blessed by the special attention she gave people when they called with an urgent request. As with Alberto, Ellen demonstrated Rabbi Lukinsky's lesson about every staff member at a synagogue being integral to the message of holiness, a kindness that we try to project all the time – which our current staff members continue to do.
