Take Some Time for Your Soul

A few weeks ago, at Kiddush lunch following Shabbat morning services, we enjoyed a cocktail called the "New Fashioned (Name)," a playful take on the classic Old Fashioned. Inspired by that week's Torah portion, Parshat Va-Era, it



referenced the new name God reveals to Moses — a reminder that revelation is always unfolding. Our friend Dr. Barry Erner lovingly crafts fun and educational cocktail creations like this each and every week; an illustration – perhaps a prototypical example – of the spirit of joy, creativity, and connection you'll experience when you show up for Shabbat at TBE.

Shabbat is already Judaism's most powerful tool for nourishing the soul and fostering community. As Rabbi Elie Kaunfer recently put it in his book *Empowered Judaism*, Shabbat is ultimately "a day of encounter" — an opportunity to experience the Divine within ourselves, beyond ourselves, and reflected in the people around us. But too often, we don't take full advantage of that opportunity.

I get it. We're busy. Even (maybe, ironically, especially) on Saturdays. Or, conversely, Saturday is our day to not be busy — to relax, to recharge, to stay in comfy clothes and avoid obligations. We budget our time carefully, and for many of us, fostering spirituality and connecting with community are but two of any number of competing priorities. And that's if we even agree with the premise that coming to shul actually facilitates spiritual nourishment and communal connections. Many of us associate Shabbat services with having to get dressed up just to sit quietly in an uncomfortable pew for hours on end. Who has time for that?!

The good news is that Shabbat doesn't have to be that way. And we are actively working to reshape the Shabbat experience at Temple Beth El into something vibrant, welcoming, and deeply meaningful. Drawing inspiration from thriving congregations like B'nai Jeshurun in New York and IKAR in Los Angeles — along with our own community's unique spirit — we're focused on making Shabbat the heart of congregational life at TBE, building deeper relationships across generations and fostering a sense of belonging, spiritual engagement, and social justice action.

Here's what that looks like:

• New and diverse prayer experiences – From our new (traditional-style) Roots and ("Rising Song"-inspired) Koleinu Shabbat evening services, to special musical experiences like Hawaiian Shabbat, to reviving familiar favorites like Shabbat in the Round and Praying the Margins, we're developing worship experiences that make the tradition come alive for people of all backgrounds, ages, and stages in meaningful, engaging, and inspiring ways. And we're also making services more intimate and communal, *Continued on page 4...*

Choosing a theme for the annual Cantor's Concert is always a fun undertaking. In my years at TBE we have had Telling Our Stories Through Song with Nefesh Mountain, The Long and Winding Road for my Installation, Zamir Chorale and Zamir Noded, Some Enchanted Evening, and this year our concert will be All That Glitters: An Evening of Opera and Song. This concert will feature the sparkling gems of beloved and recognizable opera arias and songs. Many of you know that my background is in classical vocal performance and that my very first career involved singing in regional opera companies and teaching private voice lessons before I embarked more formally into teaching and then the cantorate. I have always wanted to share the music of this style and genre with our congregation. With the exception of a couple of prayers on the High Holidays, the opportunity to sing opera with full voice at the synagogue is a rare occurrence and one that I'm looking forward to with delight!

Joining me for this concert are three wonderful musicians, Cantor Daniel Mendelson, Talya Smilowitz, and Scott Stein.

Ever since the first time that I heard Cantor Mendelson sing at a Cantors Assembly conference in L.A. in 2021, I hoped to bring him to TBE for a concert. His masterful technique and ease in singing Hazzanut and opera dazzled when he sang duets in a performance with his father Cantor Jack Mendelson.

Talya Smilowitz is one of my soul sisters in song. She and I performed a similar concert at her shul, Congregation L'dor Vador in Oyster Bay, Long Island this past December and we had such fun. Talya's background is also in classical voice and she studied at Julliard and Manhattan School of Music. She serves as cantor at Congregation L'dor Vador and also teaches voice, acting, and yoga and you are sure to be charmed by her presence and phenomenal voice.

Scott Stein is a gifted pianist and all-around mensch who I'm thrilled to be welcoming to TBE. He is a soughtafter collaborator, working in many genres from musical theater to rock, country, cantorial and choral music. He serves on the faculty of the cantorial schools at the Jewish Theological Seminary and Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

At this 2025 Cantor's Concert we will be honoring Lisa and Jeff Manheim. Lisa was the president of TBE when I was hired, and I've had the opportunity to witness her

leading from floor level and creating space for dialogue.

• An intergenerational and family-friendly environment – A new play space for kids in the back of the sanctuary encourages young families to attend and participate. Tot Shabbat is returning, and we're working on other ways to make Shabbat welcoming and accessible for all.

More opportunities to connect and engage – Through regular, lively Shabbat dinners and lunches; thoughtprovoking discussions; increased lay participation in services — fellow congregants leading prayers, chanting Torah, sharing Divrei Torah – we are thinking creatively about how Shabbat at TBE can grow into a true community hub.

We are especially excited for **Shabbat Across America on Friday, March 7**, a chance to unite with thousands of Jews across the country in celebrating Shabbat together. And the very next day, we are launching **Shabbat Lab**, a new monthly opportunity to engage with our tradition and with one another in creative ways, providing multiple points of entry and access for people of all backgrounds, ages, and stages. Our inaugural Shabbat Lab on **Saturday, March 8** will feature parallel services: our traditional Sanctuary service and the return of our "Praying the Margins" service.

I'm certain that showing up for Shabbat at TBE will enrich your life and strengthen our community. You'll hear children playing and praying. You'll connect with others. You'll sing along with beautiful music. You'll eat good food and stretch your mind. WE WELCOME YOU TO JOIN US ON SHABBAT MORNINGS

We warmly welcome you to show up for services on Shabbat in whatever way is meaningful to you. A reminder: you don't have to attend services to come for lunch on Shabbat! Services begin at 10 am, and we get to lunch around 12:15 pm. You can also show up for and/or leave services any time:

• From 10 until about 10:30 am, we sing the joyous and soulful melodies of P'sukei D'zimrah, the preliminary service.

•From about 10:30 to 10:45 am is the morning service, Shaharit (including greatest hits like Shema and the Amidah).

- We take the Torah out at about 10:45 am, and chant from the Torah and Haftarah portions until about 11:30 am.
- The D'var Torah (sermon) takes place around 11:30 am.

Between 11:45 am-12:15 pm, we conclude the service with Musaf, Aleinu, and Adon Olam (we always invite children up to help lead some of these final prayers, and any kid who helps lead gets to pick a prize from the Rabbi's "Tchotchke Chest"!).

And for those who wish to partake, you are welcome to make a "L'chaim!" with us on a beverage of your choosing (whether alcoholic or non-alcoholic) after services. I can personally guarantee good bourbon, an awesome and creative signature cocktail based on the weekly Torah portion, and even better schmoozing!

On One Foot In Hebrew, "Future" can be a Verb

As we await the end of a long, cold winter, so many are struggling to confront an uncertain future. So how does the Hebrew word for future teach us how to face it?



The word is "Atid," and it is so prevalent in modern Israeli Hebrew that the chief opposition party, led by Yair Lapid, is called "Yesh Atid," "There is a future."

The word Atid can be both a noun and an adjective. As a noun, it means, of course, "future." As an adjective, it can mean "planned." And so much more – this one word teaches us to aim for a destination and plan how to get there - and then, what to do when we've arrived.

Take a look at this entry from a biblical lexicon.

י אָתִיד 'âthîyd, aw-theed'; from H6257; prepared; by implication, skilful; feminine plural the future; also treasure:—things that shall come, ready, treasures.

Brown-Driver-Briggs Lexicon [?] (Jump to Scripture Index)

Abbreviations

† עָתִיד, [H6259 [עָתוּד] adjective ready, prepared; —

STRONGS H6264:

absolute אָתִיד לַבִּידוֹר Job 15:24 a king ready for the onset; plural עַתִדִים לַיּוֹם Esther 3:14 ready for the day, so Esther 8:13 Qr (Kt עַתוּדים לַיּוֹם 2. ready = skilled in rousing Leviathan.

As we can see, an essential element in facing the future, in Hebrew, at least, is *preparation and skill*. That could involve preparing by storing supplies, a good idea in a time of great financial uncertainty. But it can also mean storing our *sanity* and setting aside anger and grief. We need to be honing our skills to be ready for the challenges that are coming.

The genius of Hebrew is that the three root letters for *Atid* can also form verbs. The reflexive form of the verb brings us the word "*Mit-ated*," "to intend."

And what is the future but the product of all our intentions? But Judaism also accounts for unintended consequences. As the Yiddish saying goes, "Man plans, and God laughs," a line inspired by Proverbs 16:9:

Mortals may plot out their course, but it is GOD who directs their steps.

But, in the audacious spirit of a people that never takes "because God says so" for an answer, the reflexive verb for *Atid* remains, for all time, "to intend." We're not allowing God to take away our intentions, even if God often messes up our anticipated results.

Our pasts are littered with good intentions gone bad, but we can't possibly face an uncertain, scary future Continued on page 6...

without a degree of intentionality.

There's one final twist. Another derivative of the threeletter root is *Atud* - a he-goat, fit for sacrifice. You can also see references in biblical dictionaries to other grown animals, like a well-developed horse, fit for battle. In more general terms, it can also imply readiness or preparedness, reflecting a state of being set apart for a specific purpose. In the sacrificial system of ancient Israel, the he-goat was a significant animal, symbolizing atonement and purification. What does that have to do with the future?

Here's where I think the word *Atid* ultimately leads us. We are not merely meeting up with an unknown and scary future these days. We are approaching a crossroads for

each of us. Each of us has been set apart for a special mission, like the goat - we've been prepared by the solid, moral values that our parents and teachers taught us. We are ready, we are facing the task with pure intentions. The he-goat in us is ready for whatever sacrifices we might be called upon to make. And the horse in us is at full gallop, ready for battle.

We've been set apart for a specific purpose. Not to be sacrificed, like the goat, but to make sacrifices, and not to allow ourselves, our country and our planet to be consumed by hate and greed.

So, the future is a verb, and the action prescribed involves planning, preparation, readiness and focus. "To future," then is to be prepared... with intentionality.

In the words of Winston Churchill, "Have no fear of the future. Let us go forward into its mysteries, tear away the veils which hide it from our eyes, and move onwards with confidence and courage."

The sun is about to rise on a new day.



Stores engaged in the sale of hametz during Passover are excluded Passover are excluded.
